From 64-East or WEST

- Take 64 to 95 South (Route to Petersburg)
- Take exit 74-A Downtown Expressway/195 off of I-95
- Stay in right lane when road becomes more than one lane
- Take next immediate exit - Canal Street
- 30-cent toll; booth is often unmanned, so have 30-cents on hand
- Promptly get into far right lane after the tollbooth (you're on Canal Street)
- Turn right at first light, which puts you on 10th Street (one-way street)

Description: The morning events will be held at the Marshall House, home for many years of the Great Chief Justice, John Marshall.

Senior Justice Harry L. Carrico of the Virginia Supreme Court will speak on "The Judicial Philosophy of John Marshall". This will be followed by a presentation of our "Justice in the Classroom" program (with handouts and classroom resources). Many of the Virginia SOL's related to our Nation's judicial system are targeted in this program. Several of Marshall's most significant cases will be featured as well. Teachers next will take a guided tour of the Marshall House--the oldest free-standing brick home in Richmond that is filled with many original furnishings. The morning session will wrap up with a wonderful video, " Mr. Chief Justice". Box lunches will be provided by Cateraide.

For the afternoon sessions, we'll cross the street to enter the Library of Virginia. Ms. Tameka Hobbs, Education and Programs Coordinator at the Library, will introduce teachers to the many resources and programs available to support both teachers and students.

Finally, we'll walk a little further down 9th Street to the Supreme Court of Virginia where Ms. Lesley David, Deputy Clerk of the Supreme Court, will provide a guided tour of the Court. Teachers will have an opportunity to be in the main courtroom of the Supreme Court where the portraits of past justices are hung and where our seven justices hear actual cases.

Lunch: The Marshall Foundation will provide box lunches, water and soft drinks via Cateraide.

If the weather is pleasant, teachers can eat outside in the beautiful garden area. We also have indoor space in the event of inclement weather or if they wish to eat indoors.

Extra: When teachers arrive at the Marshall House between 8:00 and 8:30, coffee, donuts and juice will be provided. No food or drinks may be taken into the House, except for one designated area.

Description: The Maggie L. Walker National Historic Site commemorates the life of a progressive and talented African American woman. Armed with courage, perseverance, extraordinary intellect and charisma, Maggie L. Walker overcame the obstacles of poverty, race, gender and physical handicap to fulfill her dream of achievement.

Come meet the new staff at the Maggie L. Walker National Historic Site. New exhibits and education programs will make this an exciting experience for you and your students.

View the film, tour the Exhibit Hall, take a ranger-guided tour of the Maggie L. Walker House, and explore historic Jackson Ward. Learn about the new education programs and travel trunk developed by Henrico Teacher, Annie Evans and park staff. Lessons include: The St. Luke Emporium, Maggie Walker and the NAACP, Surviving the Great Depression, Living in the Era of Jim Crow, and Webquest. Park curator, Klydie Thomas will give a "Behind the Scenes" look at historic preservation and placement of artifacts throughout the house and Exhibit Hall.

Directions: The Maggie L. Walker National Historic Site Visitor Center is located at 600 North 2nd Street in Richmond, Virginia.

Visitors traveling north on I-95 take exit 76A, Chamberlayne Avenue, turn left at the light, go to the first light and turn left onto West Leigh Street. Go 3 blocks to 2nd Street where the National Historic Site is located on the left.

Visitors traveling south on I-95, take exit 76B at Belvidere and turn left at the stop sign onto West Leigh Street. Go approximately 8 blocks to 2nd Street where the National Historic Site is located on the left.

Visitors traveling east on I-64: take I-95 South and the directions for traveling south on I-95.

Visitors traveling west on I-64, take the Downtown/ 5th Street exit. Turn right at the first light, Jackson Street. Go two blocks to 3rd Street and turn left. At the next light (Leigh Street) turn right. Turn right onto 2nd Street. The National Historic Site is located on the left at 600 North 2nd Street.

Street parking is available without charge.

Richmond National Battlefield Park: Interpretation, Research and Restoration

Description: Two of the largest Union operations of the Civil War, the Peninsula Campaign of 1862 and the Overland Campaign of 1864 brought Union troops within sight of Richmond. Previously unknown places - names like Cold Harbor and Gaines' Mill attained national significance for the key battles that were fought there. Explore these battlefields through our ranger guided tours, exhibits and electric battle maps. Discover our new podcast and GPS programs that will enhance classroom learning. Take a "Behind the Scenes" look at our newest park site, Rural Plains. Rural Plains has witnessed many historic events including the 1754 wedding of Patrick Henry and Sarah Shelton, and the May 1864 battle of Totopotomoy Creek, during which the Shelton house served as headquarters for General Winfield S. Hancock. Tour the site with Mike Andrus, acting Chief of Interpretation to learn about the many layers of history and planned preservation projects for this historic site.

Richmond National Battlefield Park at Tredegar: Discover the Civil War Richmond at Historic Tredegar Iron Works

Description: As the industrial center and political capital of the Confederacy, Richmond was the prize over which two mighty American armies contended in bloody battle from 1861 to 1865. Tredegar Iron works geared quickly into the industrial engine that sustained the Confederate war machine. Participants will gain a better understanding of Richmond's vital role during the Civil War as an industrial, governmental, social and military city. Ranger-guided tours will explore Tredegar Iron Works by examining photographs, diaries, timelines, and artifacts to tell the stories of Richmond's military and civilian populations, both black and white. Participants will learn the vital role played by artillery and simulate the actions of an 8 member gun crew. Ranger Mike Gorman will conduct a walking tour of Belle Isle, used as a Confederate prison camp during the Civil War.

After Lunch visit the American Civil War Center's exhibit, In the Cause of Liberty and explore the Civil War's causes, course, and legacies on a national scale. The exhibit includes four state of the art films, maps, 150 artifacts and timelines, and interprets the Civil War from three perspectives: Union, Confederate and African American.

Tour the grounds of Tredegar Iron Works with the Center's educator, Jenny Didas. Learn about the multi-cultural workforce, the leadership of Joseph Reid Anderson, and discover what living and working conditions were like for the men behind the iron production.

Traveling north on I-95: take exit 74C, which merges onto 17th Street. Take 17th Street to Broad Street (4 blocks). Turn right on Broad Street and stay on it to 14th Street (3 blocks). Turn left on 14th Street and stay on it to Canal Street. Turn right and stay on Canal Street to 5th Street (9 blocks). Turn left on 5th Street and stay on it to Tredegar Street (2 blocks). Turn right on Tredegar Street and then turn right again into the parking lot for the American Civil War Center and Richmond National Battlefield Park's Civil War Visitor Center.

Traveling South on I-95: use exit 75 (3rd Street) for Civil War Visitor Center. The off ramp will merge onto 3rd Street. Stay on 3rd Street to Cary Street (9 blocks). Turn left onto Cary Street. Stay on Cary Street to 5th Street (2 blocks). Turn right onto 5th Street and stay on it until Tredegar Street (about 2 blocks). Turn right on Tredegar Street and then turn right again into the parking lot for the American Civil War Center and Richmond National Battlefield Park's Civil War Visitor Center.

Traveling east on I-64: follow to intersection with I-95 south through the city of Richmond. Follow the above directions for I-95 south.

Traveling west on I-64, use the 5th Street (downtown) exit for the Richmond National Battlefield Park Civil War Visitor Center at Tredegar Iron Works. Take 5th Street to its end (12 blocks), turn right onto Tredegar Street, then right into the parking lot. (Note: Due to construction downtown, 5th Street is sometimes blocked at Broad Street. In this event, turn left onto Broad Street and drive three blocks to 8th Street. Turn right on 8th Street and continue on it to Canal Street. Turn right on Canal Street and drive three blocks to 5th Street. Turn left onto 5th Street and take it to its end at Tredegar Street. Turn right onto Tredegar Street and then right again into the parking lot.)
